

U3A Hobsonville-**Learning is Forever**

The November meeting of U3A Hobsonville was the final meeting for the year and our guest speaker Judge Charles Blackie spoke on his experiences as the Chief Justice for the Pitcairn Island Affairs.

The Pitcairn Islands are a British Territory, situated 3000 miles East of New Zealand and 3000 miles West of Chile with a population of around 50 with a maximum of 60 - a very isolated group of islands in the Pacific. The group of islands consists of Pitcairn, Henderson, Ducie and Oena Islands, but only Pitcairn is inhabited. To actually to get to the Pitcairn Islands you fly to Tahiti, then take a small aircraft to Mangareva Island and from there it is 600 miles by boat. The Pitcairn Islands terrain is extremely steep, covering 1100 acres of volcanic soil and rocks with very tropical vegetation. Ships cannot anchor off shore at Pitcairn as the depth of the water is 12 thousand metres deep. Bird life and fish is abundant and there are no four-legged animals on Pitcairn, only "Mrs T" a Galapagos Tortoise, who was born in 1934 and enjoys eating the tropical fruit and vegetables.

In 2004 Judge Blackie was part of the legal team that tried 14 men who were involved in sexual abuse cases. Pitcairn had not had a Judge for 200 years and these cases were history in the making. The court cases actually took place on Pitcairn Island and the logistics of getting there was unbelievable. Everything had to be taken which included all the food for 2 months, legal books, and their legal clothing - the normal dress code on Pitcairn is T-shirts, shorts and jandals. The court sat 6 days a week for nearly 6 weeks, with a satellite hook up from time to time to talk to various witnesses from New Zealand. The funding for the satellite use came from the Mormon Church in the USA at \$US22 a minute. Communications were very limited and they could only use the satellite phone for 30 minutes once a week. News from the outside world was really non-existent. In the end 7 men were convicted and sentenced. Judge Blackie will be returning to Pitcairn early next year.

Vet's Corner :: :: ::

~ Hotspots

Dog hotspots are not nightclubs for canines; they are a lot less fun than they sound.

Now that the weather is getting warmer we are seeing an increase in number of dogs with hot spots. A hotspot is an area of skin that is red, often raw and canbecome itchy or sore with infection. This damage is caused by the dog licking, chewing and scratching at its skin and the normal skin bacteria overwhelming the skin defences.

There are a number of different things that can irritate the skin and cause your dog to chew and scratch but common ones include flea bites, thick or matted coats, allergies, or scratches after moving through the shrub undergrowth. The location of the hotspot can also suggest another underlying cause e.g. ear infection, anal gland infection, or arthritis problems.

The first step is clipping or shaving the coat around the hotspot and cleaning to allow the air at it. Sometimes the dog will be so sore they will need sedation first. Depending on how bad the hotspot is or how many hotspots there are, they are then treated topically or with medication.

The good news is if you find them early you may not need to

visit. Any scratching, chewing or licking is a call to action. Look, clip and clean. Dry that hotspot out and save your dog some misery. Please phone though if they don't resolve or if they keep recurring.







Fire restrictions back in place



Principal Rural Fire Officer Bryan Cartelle is asking Aucklanders to take a common sense approach and ensure that if they are lighting an open air fire in any rural area, that they have a permit from Auckland Council.

The start of the restricted fire season is a timely reminder to check your insurance policy. You need to consider insurance of property for loss and replacement from fire, Public Liability Insurance, Forest & Rural Fires Act fire suppression insurance (particularly if you are in the bush or camping a lot).

Recycle your old TV at a drop-off near you

Auckland and the rest of the north of the North Island went digital on 1 December – but that doesn't mean your old TV goes into landfill.

Old televisions can be safely recycled through TV Takeback, a subsidised government-led television recycling programme now running across the Auckland region.

For a small charge of no more than \$5, residents can take their old televisions to local drop-off points. Auckland Council has partnered with specialist e-waste recyclers RCN to provide 15 locations around the region.

Recycling old televisions rather than sending them to landfill allows useful materials to be recovered, and potentially hazardous materials safely recycled or disposed of.

To date, 4188 Auckland televisions have been recycled.

Going digital on 1 December 2013, marked the final phase of the nationwide move from analogue to digital television broadcasting.

How to be a good neighbour

If your neighbours are away, you can help in many ways. Offer to make their house looked 'lived in' by:

- turning on lights and television at night
- · drawing curtains at night and opening them in the day
- mowing lawns
- clearing their mail, especially junk mail and newspapers
- using their clothesline or driveway sometimes.

Watch their home. Question strangers, but don't say the neighbours are away. Be alert. Notice any strangers around your neighbours. This includes children. Write down their description, and note the time and date. Write down the registration numbers of unfamiliar cars, vans, motorbikes or trucks. Report anything suspicious to your local police station.

Starting a neighbourhood support group:

It's easy! First, discuss the idea with a few neighbours. Together, decide how big your want your network to be. One street, perhaps? You can start small, and expand later if you like.

Then ask for a police officer to meet your group and answer questions. You'll learn various ways you might structure your group. Every group is different because every neighbourhood is different.

Some groups appoint Street Co-ordinators, an Area Co-ordinator and a Group Co-ordinator. But you can do things your own way. Just be sure that the work is shared.

Should you invite everyone in your neighbourhood to join your group? Start with the people you know. What if your neighbours include some people you don't trust? There's no need to invite them to join your group.

Starting a rural support group:

These are exactly like neighbourhood support groups, except that in the country, your 'neighbourhood' is larger. Most country districts already have a strong community network. A rural support group makes that network more efficient.

One difference is that in the country, houses are far apart. So your area may be just two houses – or a huge district.

Discuss practical ways of calling for help – for example, sirens, car horns, fog horns, flares, cell phones or flashing car lights.

When you respond to a call for help, don't go alone. Go with another person, or at least tell someone first, or call your local police and let them know what you are doing. Your safety is most important.

Herald Island Heritage: Local stories retold by Et

Ray Pollock taught at Herald Island School for four years and two terms, 1952-1956.

It was definitely a demanding, high intensity job for Ray Pollock. With limited resources he had the ability to work collaboratively within the various levels, and that would evidently benefit the school as a whole. Ray's skills for the benefit of the community came to the fore and with that a comfort or reassurance to all who knew him, in the knowledge that he gave it his "all".

When Ray was appointed he recalls the advice given to him by Mr Kendrick Smytherman was, "don't live on the island". "If you can live somewhere else in a less isolated setting it could be more beneficial for you", so Ray took his advice and arranged to live across the harbour in Greenhithe. Ray stayed with a family of dairy farmers, Mr and Mrs Dennis, who were really good people and partly because of their kindness, Ray was able to stay at the school for his full tenure. Ray rode his pushbike each day from the Dennis farm, about two miles to the Greenhithe Wharf and he recalls "Greenhithe roads were a goats' track at the time."

Once at the wharf, Ray then rowed a small pram dinghy across to the Herald Island Wharf to get to and from work for the four years and two terms. This was a distance of about 300 metres and was often a fast-flowing current varying from smooth to rough sailing especially when the wind blew from the North West direction.

There were no worries about the theft of Ray's bike or boat. "The wharf was at the bottom of Rame Road where I would normally just hide my push bike in the tea tree groves near the wharf and jump onboard my dinghy."

In a newspaper 'Auckland Star' article it was noted that the waterways between Herald Island and Greenhithe were, "usually placid waters but it is a very narrow channel". "When a northwesterly gets a bit of a chop, the sea can be a bit up and down."


"Looking back, I realise wearing a heavy 'south west' raincoat, gumboots and no life jacket could be a pretty risky occupation. If it rained heavily the boat would have some inches of water swishing around the bottom and that had to be removed before I set sail, but I survived and fortunately, never fell out. We were really dedicated teachers then as keeping the school open was the priority."

Ray recalled, "There was no telephone communication so if anyone wanted to come and see me; they had to write and arrange transport. I would pick them up on prior arrangement from the Greenhithe Wharf. It was a lonely existence in the professional sense and the only occasional visitors were the Nature Study and Physical Education Advisers who were very welcome."

"There would be regular inspections every 2 years from the Department of Education Inspectorate, as all teachers were graded on performance in those years. Teachers were ranked in order of experience and competency. The police launch, 'Lady Shirley' and the Sergeant of Police would come and give a talk to the children from time to time. Sometimes they would bring the Social Welfare Officer too."

Because transportation from the island was difficult, there were few opportunities for children to visit more widely. However, in 1953 the whole school travelled to Devonport for the initial visit of Queen Elizabeth II when she visited Auckland. Favourable consideration was also provided by the Base Commander of the New Zealand Air Force at Hobsonville. The school had a good liaison with Hobsonville and annually the Air Force would send a high-speed launch to pick up the children and take them for a party and a look around the air base with its Sunderland and Catalina flying boats. The Air Force was very generous to the school.

Names of families on the island that he could recall were the chairman of the school committee Mr Ron Wicks. He also had memories of the Martin-Smith family's two girls - Trisha and Darrin - who did well at school also. The girls' mother, Mrs Martin-Smith did relief teaching in the school after Ray left and before the next permanent teacher, Mr Julian, was appointed to the position. Mrs Martin-Smith relieved until the end of 1956 and Mr Julian began in February 1957. The Ayres' family had three children attending; Pat, Albert and Rodney. Michael Manning has kept a constant contact with the island. Other names that come to mind include; Nigel Hooper, the Rainham boys, Karen Greenshields, Bonnie Sheldon, Eileen Shields and Ross Wheaton

Towards the end of 1956 a causeway was being constructed between an area close to The Terrace and Whenuapai. Eventually this would mean that the island was joined to the

mainland and Herald Island School would be closed with the pupils being transported by school bus to Hobsonville School. This took place at the end of 1957.

"Over the years it has been so good to see children achieving to their potential in all manner of life's activities. For example, Janet Wicks was head of her class at the New Zealand Dental Nurse's School. Bob Knox is another with a place of honour when he joined the New Zealand Police graduating from Police Training School with the Sword of Honour. Others I have heard about reached successful positions in their chosen vocations."

For the students in this sole-charge school environment the experience gave a good basis from which to help them gain degrees of independence in their work attitudes. This was essential for learning to organise and complete learning assignments. There would be quite a challenging situation for a teacher to be in, with more than forty students to be catered for at a time. Children secured quite a structured education in that social environment which in many ways represented a 'family-like' atmosphere.

There were three terms a year and at the termination of each term, two weeks of school holidays. "The happiest time for me was to see children achieving and doing so well. From a nine o'clock start until 3 pm daily being continually mobile around the classes I found it pretty tiring at times and was really pleased when the holidays came along."

The holidays would be in February, May and in August and a few days before Christmas until the beginning of February.

Ray recalled that, "During the school holidays in January I'd go to my parents and try and build up the batteries before I got back to work."

"I would also attend solecharge teacher's refresher courses in places like Masterton and this was a huge advantage for sharing information with other teachers in similar positions. These holiday refresher courses were a huge advantage during my total teaching career."

In 1956 Raymond married Betty, a fellow school teacher and has three wonderful children Christopher, Janine and Robyn with a total of seven grandchildren.

From a teacher's point of view sole-charge teaching had lots of rewards plus some side issues. "When I left the island for a position at a city school there were some issues of personal ill-health arising from being over worked," Ray taught for forty two years including post Herald Island years at Northcote College and later as an intermediate school principal and inspector of schools.

The years on Herald Island as a whole were an interesting experience because as a teacher it

taught him lessons on how to manage multilevels of children's learning. It also taught him how to organise the school administration and carry out the requirements expected of a school headmaster or principal.

Herald Island had no local authority at that time and was free for all in some respects especially in the building requirements aspects. Because the island did not fall under any local body council or local authority it was unique in this situation.

Ray received strong cooperation from parents and there were few exceptions. Some children were in need of assistance in developing self-discipline because they didn't always get it from home. This skill encourages children to be more independent. They were a mixed group of children and as expected were varied in their approach to school but the general pattern was that children were cooperative and seemed to enjoy their school experiences. Education Department Inspectors of Schools wrote favourably about the standards achieved by the pupils and the quality of the school environment.

Ray stated that as a teacher "You'd always want your students to have a good basic educational background before they went off to secondary school. In those times the children did well! Children generally, received very good reports and positive affirmations from the educational hierarchy."

A young teacher's posting to an isolated school on Herald Island in the early 1950's, certainly benefited the community as a whole, when Master Raymond Pollock gave it his "all."



Government invests further \$31 million in Hobsonville

The Government has provided an additional \$31 million of capital to the Hobsonville Land Company, a subsidiary of Housing New Zealand, to enable faster progress on a 3000 house development at Hobsonville Point in Auckland.

"Hobsonville Point is proving to be a very successful and popular housing development. This Government capital is to enable the company to purchase the remaining 16.5 hectares of land two years ahead of schedule and bring 500 houses to the market earlier." Dr Smith says.

The 16.5 hectares of land is in the south west corner of the 167 hectare Hobsonville development, adjacent to the new secondary school under construction, and in an area known as the Village and Buckley blocks. The land is being purchased from the New Zealand Defence Force and the price has been determined by a process of valuation and arbitration.

"The original plan was that the Hobsonville Land Company would not purchase this area until 2015 and would fund it from house sale proceeds. The Company presented a business case, approved by Cabinet, showing it was better for the taxpayer and for housing supply to bring forward this purchase and development," Dr Smith says.

"The big gains in housing will come from private housing developments off the back of Government reforms to free up land supply, increase competition in building materials, and constrain council development and compliance costs. Hobsonville highlights the Government's pragmatic approach where we are getting on and freeing up Crown land for housing developments where it makes sense."





Festive food



I love Christmas, I love the food, I love the smell of pine trees, and making special 'foodie' gifts for family is awesome. The sparkle and magic of Christmas is alive.

I think of my father at this time of the year as we both made Stollens (German Christmas cakes). He also made fabulous deep, baked cheesecakes, and they were simply devine!

The recipe below has the consistency of a cheesecake and is a family favourite; it's smashing served cold with a dob of whipped cream on the side. It's based on a recipe from Annabelle White's cookbook, 'Annabelle Cooks'.

Perfect Pumpkin Pie

Ingredients:

- 250gm container Cream Cheese (softened)
- 3/4 cup Sugar
- 1tsp Cinnamon
- 1/4 cup Golden Syrup
- 1tsp Vanilla Essence
- 3 Eggs
- 250gm container Sour Cream
- 2 cups cooked, mashed Pumpkin
- 3/4 cup plain Flour
- 400gm Sweet Short Pastry (sheets of pre-rolled pastry are a great option)

Method:

- Preheat oven to 160degC fan bake or 180degC normal bake.
- Make sure the oven rack is set at the bottom of the oven.
- Put cream cheese, sugar and cinnamon in a large bowl and combine together with an electric mixer. Add golden syrup, vanilla, eggs, sour cream, pumpkin and flour.
- Blend until just combined.
- Grease and line a round 24cm tin with pastry.
- Pour in the pumpkin mixture.
- Bake until firm to touch in the centre. Check after 35-40mins.
- · Cool.
- Top with a dusting of cinnamon or nutmeg, refrigerate.
- We prefer it served cold with whipped cream.


